






James & William Vaughan Texas Martyrs (Gen 4)

~250 miles Tennessee to Cairo, IL – arrived 12/14/183514 days to New Orleans, arrived 12/28/1835

- > Rode to Texas, joined Col. J. Fannin's Army
- > Fought 4 battles 2/27/1836 3/20/1836
- > Fannin surrendered to Gen. Urrea at Coleto Creek with parole
- > Santa Anna overruled Urrea, called Texians "Pirates"
- ➤ Marched to Goliad, ~435 of Fannin's army executed 3/27/1836
- > Vaughan Family Bible: "massacred in Fannin's Army, Goliod, Texes on

The 26th March A.D. 1836."



Gen 4 Francis Asbury Vaughan Before the Civil War

- Born January 18, 1831, Bledsoe County, Tennessee
- 13th of 14 children of George & Catherine Roberts Vaughan
- Moved to Mississippi 1833, then to Texas 1850
- 1855 married Louisa Adaline McKenzie, Guadalupe Cnty, TX
- 4 children before Civil War, 5 children after the war


Francis Asbury Vaughan's Civil War


- February 1, 1861 Texas seceded
- > 7/4/1862 F. A. Vaughan left TX to join Union Army
- > 3½ months by horseback & ship to Ft. Jackson, LA
- 10/27/1862 Enlisted as Sgt. USA 1st TX Cavalry (MRR)
 - > 12/2/1862 Commissioned 2nd Lt.
 - > 10/14/1864 Promoted Captain, Commander Co. F
 - > 1865 Aide-de-Camp to Gen. Edmund J. Davis (future TX Gov.)
- 7/29/1865 Mustered out, returned home to Central TX










Leaving the mouth of the Rio Grande River for New Orleans

• ~July 28, 1862, Group 1 sailed for New Orleans, arrived August 23, 1862

"But they [Confederates] found it out and maid an attempt to capture them after they got aboard the schooner but failed. They got off without the captain of the schooner and the mate didn't know anything about navigating the sea & got lost and was out twenty six days & they had several storms on them during the time. ... almost come to the conclusion that they was lost for good when they was picked up by a Man of War & brought in"



From F. A. Vaughan's Civil War Diary

August 1862, Group 2 in Matamoros waiting for ship to New Orleans

" ... rocked along & tried to injoy ourselves the best way we could. ...

I causioned the boys not to have anything to do with it [a "fandango" in the town square] or go about it for if they did there was a strong probility of getting into difficulty. But they wouldn't heed to what I sed and went their own way."


"And the result was one of the men that was staying with us got in a row with some Mexicans & killed two just between our house and the dancing ground."

August 1862, Group 2 in Matamoros waiting for ship to New Orleans (cont'd.)

"This caused a greate excitement. The rest of us were shut up in the house asleep. The Mexicans gathered all round our house and raved and charged and broke in all the doors of the houses on the side of the square where we was but they didn't breake in ours as they knew we had several guns in there & they supposed it to be death to a good many of them."

"And so it would be for we knew that if they broke in on us they would slaughter us although we was as inosent of the act that had taken place as an infant."






From F. A. Vaughan's Civil War Diary Dec. 31, 1862, Aboard Steamship Cumbra Heading for Galveston


"... we left on the 31st of December with light hearts for Texas on the steamship Cumbra"

"... Then came sickness and unplesentness but we endured it patiently for the thought that we was going to Texas where everything that was near and dear to us was encearcle by its borders – and whom we had not seen for months nor not eaven heard from our wifes and little ones whoom I would lay my life down for made us more ancious to reach that state."




Francis Asbury Vaughan 1865 – 1896

- > Farmer, real estate, mercantiler, attorney, civil servant
- > 5 children born after the war, wife died 1880
- Civil Roles most from Edmund J. Davis, future Texas Gov.
 - 1865 1869 Deputy Collector International Revenue
 - 1868 1869 Delegate to TX Const. Convention
 - 1870-1874 Dist. & County Clerk, Guadalupe County
 - 3/1/1871 Lt. Col. of Texas Militia
 - 1880 Supervisor of Census, 6th District
 - 1882-1885 Customs Collector, Gulf Coast
 - 1887-1890 Mayor of Seguin, TX
 - 1890-1894 Customs Collector, Mexico border
- > 5/23/1896 F. A. Vaughan died at 65 in Seguin



- Vaughan family home for 155 years







